# **CRN North Thames Research Awards 2023**

Nominations are open for the CRN North Thames Research Awards 2023. This new award scheme has been designed to recognise and celebrate some of the incredible research delivery achievements made across the North Thames area. There are 18 categories in total, including the 'Community Award for Engagement' award and the 'Excellence in PPIE' award.

# Patient Research Experience Survey (PRES) 2023/24

We urgently need support from our researcher colleagues to achieve our PRES target. Having recorded just 169 responses so far this year, as indicated by the chart below, we have a long way to go to reach our target of 535. Between January and the end of March, we have 366 responses to submit, equating to roughly 100 per month. This means we require a big push from all teams who are delivering PRES. We have been informed by CRN North Thames that several surveys have recently been submitted with no site code or study identifiers. Where this is the case, there is no way to determine which site these may relate to. We must therefore stress the importance of ensuring that patients have the appropriate study identifiers **prior to completing the survey**. In the case of paper surveys, please ensure delivery teams pre-populate this information before the survey is given to the participant.

# Working with public contributors

We have become aware that a small group of public contributors are volunteering to get involved in multiple research projects across the Trust and Medical School. Whilst we welcome their active involvement, working with such a small group does not help to further our inclusion agenda – which is to broaden our reach and encourage a much wider group of people to 'get involved' in research. James and I are exploring ways to replenish our database with people who want to be *actively involved* in our projects and encourage our researchers to do the same, with locally held databases.

We also need to ensure that public contributors are adding value to your projects. This includes offering appropriate training and support, making reasonable adjustments for those who are in need, agreeing expectations and ways of working and being prepared to address non-engagement whenever it occurs. We are aware of a few instances where public contributors login to PPIE meetings but do not participate or do not complete the required exercise yet expect PPIE payments. Providing (access to) training, setting expectations early on or offering payments 'on satisfactory completion' of a PPIE activity can help to avoid such instances.

#### **NHS Health Literacy Tools**

NHS England Knowledge and Library Services have put together some useful <u>health literacy tools</u> on their website. Designed for patients, their families and carers as well as the health and care staff supporting them, the main focus is a review of tools and techniques that are freely available. #### **Research England appoints expert advisory group in EDI**

The expert advisory group will provide insight and perspective to support Research England in creating and sustaining the conditions for a healthy, dynamic, diverse and inclusive research and knowledge exchange system in English universities. #### HRA co-chair a working group on the use of health and social care data

The HRA is supporting the development of a network of NHS Secure Data Environments (SDEs) in England. SDEs are data storage and access platforms, which uphold the highest standards of privacy and security of NHS health and social care data. For research purposes, the data has all personal details removed before it becomes accessible.

In the spirit of co-design, the HRA asked public contributors to join a group where they could give valuable insight into the design of the network and lend a critical eye over some key areas of HRA governance involving data access policy and regulatory approvals. #### **Queen Mary University of London Small Grants**

The Centre for Public Engagement Small Grants funding scheme is open to applications for 2023-24. The Small Grants are a monthly opportunity for students and staff to apply for up to £1,000 to support public engagement, community engagement, or patient and public involvement projects. The deadline for the next round is **15 February 2024** and the scheme will run every month until May 2024.
